<u>Course Description</u>: This is an introductory level course that provides a general overview of modern society's institutions, its organization, groups and social roles. Topics of study will include patterns of social interaction, the organization and stratification of groups ranging from families to corporations, and others. The course is meant to foster understanding, open-mindedness and the valuing of others through an appreciation of human differences. This may include race, ethnicity, culture, religion, physical disability as well as class, age, gender, sexual orientation, or other considerations.

General Objectives: Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the major concepts, theoretical perspectives, empirical findings, and historical trends in behavioral sciences. This will be demonstrated by students' ability to: Describe the nature of sociology as a discipline.
- 2. Use the concepts, language, and major theories of the discipline to account for sociological phenomena.
- 3. Explain major perspectives of sociology (e.g., structural-functionalism, social conflict, feminism, and symbolic-interaction).
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding representing appropriate breadth and depth in selected content areas of sociology.
- 5. Acquire a working knowledge of basic sociological concepts and principles
- 6. Be able to evaluate the impact of social class, gender, race/ethnicity/immigrant status, age, and sexual orientation on people's chances in life, their practices, and attitudes.
- 7. Analyze, explain (orally and in writing), and apply key sociological theories, concepts and terms to social issues.

<u>Course Requirements:</u> Students are expected to be familiar with the substantive contents of all class materials: assigned readings, lectures, handouts, and discussions.

Assigned readings must be done thoroughly as they will provide the basis for weekly discussions.

Failure to prepare adequately may impede your participation and the ability to benefit fully from the course.

Evaluation Methods:

a) Discussions =15%. b) Quizzes (4) = 60% c) Final Exam = 25% Total =100%

- 1. Quizzes & Exams: will consist of objective multiple choices questions based on assigned readings, lectures, and handouts.
- 2. Must be taken within the indicated 3- day period. Once you start a test, you have only a pre-set amount of time to finish it. My advice: don't start a test unless you're SURE you can finish it.
- **3. DON'T wait until the last minute**. If you wait until the last hour to take the test, AND your computer happens to crash at that same time, I won't be sympathetic in that case, you'll have to miss that test. Test questions will consist of multiple choices based on lectures/handouts and chapter readings.
 - 4. <u>DO NOT USE</u> unauthorized materials, such textbooks, or lecture notes. Students found guilty of academic dishonesty will receive an "F" Grade in the course and could be subjected to further punishment deemed necessary by the college authorities. ***SAVE EACH INDIVIDUAL ANSWER BEFORE YOU PROCEED

<u>WEEKLY DISCUSSIONS - (5 points):</u> You ABSOLUTELY need to stay up-to-date in this course. It's structured so that everyone is looking at the same lesson and participating in the same discussions, every week. If you'll notice, the topics correspond to "Weeks" in a semester-long course. Besides "Course Content," the only other thing you'll need on the left-blue-margin is "Discussions," and "Quizzes and Exams," for when it's quiz or exam time. Those are calendar-controlled, so they'll only be available during certain windows of time during the course.

Discussion topics are available from Monday 12:01 am to Sunday 6:00 pm. Avoid making submissions at the last minute.

Students must make their initial posting on the topic and respond to at least three of their colleague's comments/postings/arguments etc. However, one or two lines statement (s) will not count towards your grade. Maintain civility always during these discussions.

If you agree or disagree, explain why you agree or disagree and remember to identify by name the person(s) your comments or compliments arguments are directed at. I need names to be able to verify that this interaction took place. Students who fail to identify others by name will lose points.

The more students you interact or communicate with, the more your comments and questions will not only help me make sure that you understand the material; they will also get some interesting discussions going on that should make the class even more exciting

These are your class participation exercises, therefore, absolutely no make-ups for missed discussions. **Grading:** Your grade on the **Discussions** will depend on two factors.

- 1. The quantity, quality, and thoroughness of your initial reply to the Discussion Question.
- 2. The quantity, quality, and thoroughness of your responses to the replies of other students in the class.
