#### **Course Description:**

Students will learn and practice the craft elements of writing poetry, fiction, and/or non-fiction, examine the works of writers in the genres, and receive and offer critique. Students will submit pieces for possible publication in MxCC's literary journal, *Pegasus*.

#### Scope of Course:

Students will explore and hone their creative skills in writing poetry, short fiction, and personal narrative while reading, examining, and discussing works in the various genres. Students will use models for understanding and putting into practice the cause and effect relationship among style, form, and meaning, and develop voice and technique. While students will look to their own lives as a guide or driver for inspiration, they will also aim to reflect in their works recognition of the reader within the writer, expressions of the human experience which connect us all. Students will provide peer feedback on their original works, giving thoughtful and critical comments and suggestions, always beginning with what they like about a piece and then moving to what areas may be confusing or alarming or inconsistent in some way. Feedback should be as specific as possible. Students will not have a comprehensive exam but will be required to submit 3-5 pieces for possible publication in our college's literary journal, of which I am the faculty editor. Although I am editor, I do not choose the pieces for publication. I help in the process, but submission readers consist of four or five other English faculty and student officers in the Creative Writing Club.

# ENG 281, Creative Writing

This course is important because it will introduce students to various genres of creative writing, such as poetry, fiction, and creative non-fiction, among others, as well as hone their skills in the creation of the works they produce. English 281 meets all general education core competencies but Mathematical Reasoning.

Communication:

The interactive process through which there is an exchange of verbal and/or nonverbal information.

- Cultural Awareness: Acknowledgement that society is diverse with groups of individuals possessing differing beliefs, values, attitudes, and customs that are shared from one generation to the next.
- Social and Civic Responsibility: Behavior that demonstrates adherence to legal/ethical standards established by society.
- Critical Thinking: Modes of reasoning including analyzing data, evaluating alternatives, setting priorities, and predicting outcomes.
- Mathematical Reasoning: Determination of approach, materials, and strategies necessary to solve a problem. Technology Utilization:
- **Technology Utilization:** Use tools of the trade to achieve a specific outcome.

These core competencies are important personally, academically, and professionally. The outcomes, as stated in the syllabus, are covered in this course. This course may be used to meet program requirements in General Studies and other select programs.

# **Course Requirements:**

- Meet all assignment guidelines. Complete all exercises (in grade book, these will be marked by a check, as "complete" or "incomplete"); approximately six poems (final drafts); two short stories, and one non-fiction (memoir) piece.
- Submit pieces for possible publication in MxCC's creative writing journal, *Pegasus*. Submit 3-5 poems; one short fiction and/or your memoir piece. Include submissions with final portfolio packet labeled *Pegasus* Submissions, and provide submissions electronically, through this email: MX-Pegasus@mxcc.edu.
- Relinquish the notion of anonymity! You must be willing to share your work in a workshop style format—small group and whole class discussions, listening, helping, and supporting one another in meeting personal writing goals.
- Offer thoughtful feedback to others; be respectful in your critique of others' works, providing both positive feedback and constructive criticism, starting with what you liked about the pieces before offering suggestions for improvement.
- Pay attention to grammar, syntax, and mechanics for stylistic achievement (i.e., know the difference between a sentence fragment and a stylistic fragment).

# Grading Criteria:

Poetry:	5 poems, 10 points each =	50
Fiction:	2 stories, 10 points each =	20
Memoir:	1 story, 15 points =	15
Participation:		15

Students must regularly and actively evaluate and critique others' works; thoughtfully revise pieces once or twice; carefully edit their own works; and demonstrate a solid command of Standard English and how to manipulate and stylize it. Please note that participation points are earned by the following: completing the exercises which are graded "complete/incomplete;" reviewing and evaluating peers' work and preparing thoughtful and helpful written feedback; and completing discussion postings.
