Introduction to Anthropology

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<u>Course Description</u>: A survey of major fields of anthropology-physical anthropology, archaeology, and cultural anthropology- with emphasis on the distinctive anthropological perspective on human beings and their works. Non-Western cultures will be the focus of the cultural analysis. The course is meant to foster understanding, open- mindedness and the valuing of others through an appreciation of human differences. This may include race, ethnicity, culture, religion, physical disability as well as class, age, gender, sexual orientation, or other considerations. **Prerequisite**: Eligible for either ENG*101E or ENG*101.

General Learning Objectives:

- a. To understand the discipline of anthropology and the anthropological perspective, and the contribution to our understanding of social phenomena
- b. Understand the basic concepts in anthropology and their fundamental theoretical interrelationships, such that students will be able to define, give examples, show interrelationships, and demonstrate the relevance of culture, human evolution, cultural variation, and social stratification.
- c. To understand the role of theory in anthropology, such that the student will be able to:
 - d. Define theory, describe, and illustrate its role in building anthropological knowledge.
 - e. Compare and contrast basic theoretical orientations in reference to social phenomena.
 - f. Understand and show how theories reflect the historical and social contexts of the times and cultures in which they were developed.
- g. To understand the role of evidence and qualitative and quantitative methods in anthropology and ethical codes that govern the conduct of anthropologists and how anthropological knowledge may apply to people's lives.
- h. Understand and gain an awareness of internal diversity of U.S. society and the significance of variations by race/ethnicity, gender, sexuality, class, age.
- i. Think critically and apply critical thinking skills to anthropological data and theory in global context.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion, student will be able to:

- 1. Explain social, organizational, political, economic, historical, or cultural elements that influence and are influenced by individuals and groups.
- 2. Explain theories and research methods used to investigate social phenomena.
- 3. Explain ethical issues pertaining to social contexts and phenomena.
- 4. Explain issues of diversity within and across cultures.
- 5. Apply concepts or theories of social phenomena to real world situations (e.g., service learning, group work, clubs, organizations, civic engagement, conflict resolution and internships).

Course Requirements:

- a. Assigned readings must be done thoroughly as the topics will provide the basis for class discussion.
- b. Be familiar with the substantive contents of course material: assigned readings, lectures, and discussions.
- c. Failure to prepare adequately may impede your performance and the ability to benefit fully from the course.

You do not always have to agree with your classmates; however, you must always treat others with respect when you express your disagreement.

Our goal is neither persuasion nor group consensus but learning from talking things out and listening to one another.

If you agree or disagree, explain why and address others by name to prove that you actually read and commenting to their postings/comments/opinions etc. Students who fail to incorporate material covered in the course will lose points.

The more students you interact or communicate with, the more your comments and questions will not only help me make sure that you understand the material; they will also get some interesting discussions going on that should make the class even more exciting.

Evaluation Criteria. You will be graded based on the quality and thoroughness of how well you discuss and address issues pertaining to social phenomena.

- a) Remember to incorporate some of the issues covered in the course material/readings.
- b) Your grade will also be based on the quality and thoroughness of your responses to your fellow students' arguments/opinion/comments.
- c) You're encouraged to provide constructive feedback to enhance academic growth.
- d) Be prepared to engage seriously with relevant anthropological terms/concepts and course material/readings to develop your arguments.
