COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An examination of the evolution of contemporary relationships such as dating, cohabitation and marriage. The implications of changes in relationships and their effect on the individual, family and society will be analyzed.

GENERAL OBJECTIVES OF THE COURSE:

Upon completion of the course students will be able to:

- 1. Identify the factors that have contributed to current high divorce rate among Americans.
- 2. Identify and explain gender division of labor in different cultures.
- 3. Analyze the family problems of violence and divorce.
- 4. State why the traditional image of the family no longer describes American families.
- 5. Understand the family from a global view, including patterns of mate selection and authority.
- 6. Analyze some of the changes in the American family, including the emergence of single-parent families, living together, and blended families.
- 7. Understand the social diversity of U.S. families.
- 8. Explore the future of the family as a social institution.
- 9. Examine the life-styles that are alternatives to the family such as staying single and living together.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Assigned readings must be completed on time, as they will be the bases for class Discussions.

Two exams will be given and must be taken on their assigned dates. No make-ups will be given for unexcused absences.

Weekly Discussions

Every week, you will be asked by the instructor to answer questions relating to assigned chapter on the week discussion board. You also need to respond to at least TWO messages other students posted. A weekly discussion assignment is worth a maximum of 10 points. The initial message responding to the instructor's questions is due midnight, *Saturday*, of each week. The response to at least two classmates is due midnight, *Sunday*, of each week.

You will be graded on how completely you answer the assigned discussion questions and by the quality of your response to other students' postings. **Refer to the grading rubric for a specific explication of how points are assigned to discussion responses.** Your use of critical thinking skills, conducting the research you conduct on the discussion board questions and your application of the readings will be assessed. You will have one week to conduct research and post. No late postings will be accepted.

The exams will draw from material in the text and readings, films, discussions, and instructor comments for the calendar period covered by the exam.
