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Course Description:

This is an introductory level course that provides a general overview of modern society's institutions, its organization, groups and social roles. Topics of study will include patterns social interaction, the organization and stratification of groups ranging from families to corporations, and others. The course is meant to foster understanding, open-mindedness the valuing of others through an appreciation of human differences. This may include race, disability ethnicity, culture, religion, physical as well as class. gender. age, orientation, or other considerations. Prerequisites: Placement in ENG* 101. sexual

General Objectives: Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the major concepts, theoretical perspectives, empirical findings, and historical trends in behavioral sciences.
- 2. Use the concepts, language, and major theories of the discipline to account for sociological phenomena.
- 3. Explain major perspectives of sociology (e.g., structural-functionalism, social conflict, feminism, and symbolic-interaction).
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding representing appropriate breadth and depth in selected content areas of sociology.
- 5. Acquire a working knowledge of basic sociological concepts and principles
- 6. Be able to evaluate the impact of social class, gender, race/ethnicity/immigrant status, age, and sexual orientation on people's chances in life, their practices, and attitudes.
- 7. Analyze, explain (orally and in writing), and apply key sociological theories, concepts and terms to social issues.

Course Requirements:

Students are expected to be familiar with the substantive contents of all class materials: assigned readings, lectures, handouts, and discussions. Assigned readings must be done thoroughly as they will provide the basis for weekly discussions. Failure to prepare adequately may impede your participation and the ability to benefit fully from the course.

Course Format: The course consists of assigned readings, and discussions. **Discussions are part** of your assignment and everyone's views must be respected. Our goal is to critically consider and

evaluate different viewpoints without offending anyone. You're expected to be familiar with the substantive contents of all class materials: assigned readings and class discussions.

Topics for discussion are available from Monday 12:01 am to Sunday 6:00 pm. Avoid making submissions at the last minute. Be warned that late submissions will not be graded.

You're expected to post your initial responds on the topic and respond to at least three of your classmate's postings/comments/arguments etc. Be as detailed as you can, keeping in mind that a one- or two-lines statement (s) will not count towards your grade.

If you agree or disagree, explain why and address others by name to prove that you actually read and commenting to their postings/comments/opinions etc. Students who fail to incorporate material covered in the course will lose points

The more students you interact or communicate with, the more your comments and questions will not only help me make sure that you understand the material; they will also get some interesting discussions going on that should make the class even more exciting.

Course Policies: The topics covered in this course touch upon several issues that Americans are often uncomfortable discussing openly. Consider the following as guidelines for our class discussions:

- Try to participate in discussions with as much candor as you can summon. Be sensitive to others, but do not shy away from difficult topics.
- You do not always have to agree with your classmates, however, you must always treat others with respect when you express your disagreement. Our goal is neither persuasion nor group consensus but learning from talking things out and listening to one another.

Evaluation Criteria. You will be graded based on the quality and thoroughness of how well you discuss and address issues pertaining to social phenomena – such as social class, race, ethnicity, gender, religion, political systems, marriage & the family, culture, socialization, sexuality and society and economic systems, among others. Your grade will also be based on the quality and thoroughness of your responses to your fellow students' arguments/opinion/comments. You're encouraged to provide constructive feedback to enhance academic growth. Be prepared to engage seriously with relevant anthropological terms/concepts and course material/readings to develop your arguments.
